OVERALL IMPACT

With your help and by God's grace, our work has affected children in Nepal in the following ways:



INVESTING IN GIRLS



For the last 15 years, we have focused on rescuing street children primarily boys - from the streets of Pokhara. Presently, we have 90 former street children in our care, and we are committed to investing in their lives as they overcome deep trauma and engage in education, some for the first time. However, we also recognize that girls are suffering in the shadows of Nepalese society. Consequently, we have begun to explore ways to reach out and rescue girls from their circumstances. We now have 21 girls in full-time care at our new home in Pokhara that is dedicated to protecting and nurturing girls.

As the Himalayan Life team in Chitwan has been serving children and families in the slums, they noticed a growing number of cases of trafficking, child marriage and abuse, particularly among young girls. In response, the team started the Chitwan Girls Program! Their vision is for young girls to learn health, hygiene and safety and prepare them to stand on their own feet. So far, 140 girls in the surrounding communities have been served by the new "Focus on Girls" education programs.

(RE)INVESTING IN EDUCATION



In its fourth year of operations in 2021, the Yangri Academic Centre was busy with 200 students attending Kindergarten through Grade 7, with many more students from the 15 villages in the Yangri Valley waiting to join in. To our devastation, our beloved school was hit by a cataclysmic flood in June 2021 that destroyed several buildings. Many towns in the Yangri Valley were completely inundated. We are beyond grateful that none of the students and staff were harmed by the flash flood.

Himalayan Life's first response was to provide supplies and relief to those most affected by the flooding. During this initial period, some parents of YAC students risked their lives to wade across the raging river with ropes tied around their waists to tell the teachers not to give up on their kids. The YAC team responded with commitment and strength, ensuring that we would continue to invest in education in the Yangri Valley.

Temporary schooling was set up in the remaining classrooms and in tents

devoted teachers working at the Yangri Academic Centre on the premises to ensure that education could continue. This short break in studies and financial pressures due to the global pandemic made some families reconsider their investment in their children's education. One student named Maya* was a Grade 7 student at YAC before the flood. When the school reopened, her father insisted that she quit school and start working to support the family. When this was brought to the staff's attention at YAC, the teachers visited her family to convince her father of the benefits of education and its necessity for Maya to have a bright future. Thankfully, Maya is now back at YAC to continue her schooling.

The next step for the Yangri Academic Centre is to rebuild the elementary school that was destroyed in the flash flood and build a secondary school alongside it in a new location. New land has been purchased in the village of Bangdang, just up the valley from Yangri. This new space is just shy of 10 acres and will accommodate Kindergarten to Grade 12 in one campus. We are excited about this next chapter for YAC and how it will make space for many more students, like Maya, who are eagerly awaiting an education.

INVESTING IN FAMILIES





My name is Salomi Sherpa, I'm 25 years old. My mum and dad are Lila and Sonam Sherpa, and I have a younger sister and brother. I am proud of my family. I look up on my dad, how he

untiringly throws his skills, his time and all he is into his work and leadership of the Himalayan Life school in Yangri. I admire how my mum has not just raised the three of us siblings, but hundreds of children in her capacity as hostel parent, first in Ladakh, and now in Yangri. My sister Roshni is working on her Bachelor's as an architect, and my brother Joash is a Grade 8 student at the Yangri Academic Centre.

I have no words for how grateful I am for the transformation I have experienced in and through our family. In fact, remembering the violence and utter lack of peace in our home during my early childhood still sends chills down my spine. We could not have made it without intervention or without the grace of God.

When our lives became intertwined with Himalayan Life 15 years ago, a fresh wind from a different direction started filling our sails. My parents had been migrant workers in India, desperately trying not just to make ends meet but to earn their place in society. Maybe, just maybe, if they had property, a house, car, material things, they would finally be respected as members of the community which didn't seem to have room for them. But things have turned out different in a beautiful way: My mum is now honoured as the mother of hundreds of children and young adults, and my dad is a trusted leader of the community in the Yangri Valley. The path to our identity turned out to be not affluence, but compassion and service. I am the very first graduate from any of the Himalayan Life homes. Upon completing my 12 years of schooling, I went on to earn my Bachelor's degree in Clinical Psychology, supported by a scholarship from Himalayan Life. While I still need to gain work experience and eventually would like to pursue a Master's, I already know that I want to make my vocational skills available to Himalayan Life. I simply would like to give back a little of what I have been given.

I dream of seeing more of the kind of transformation which we have experienced in our family. My heart weeps when seeing children grow up without the nurturing care they need in order to become healthy, responsible and whole adults. I want to make a difference.

I think I speak for all of our staff when saying that investing in the children is not a chore, but a privilege. We are grateful for and energized by the transformation we are seeing in the lives of the children.


